An Interview with Rachel Strayer By Laura Gardoski

Rachel Strayer earned her Master of Arts degree and her Master of Fine Arts degree in Creative Writing/Playwriting at Wilkes University. She is a writer as well as a professor, teaching classes at Keystone College and Marywood University. Every summer, Rachel teaches playwriting classes for teens here at the Library.

You're a teacher, writer, director, actor...you wear many hats! If you could only choose one role, which would it be and why? Yikes, that's tough! I think I'm going to have to say writer. Writing is something I feel compelled to do and I just can't imagine it not being part of my life. There is nothing that satisfies quite like creating something right out of your head. If I could keep writing plays and watching them be performed, I think I could be satisfied.

As an actor, you have been many characters. Who have been some of your favorites? One of my favorites was my first college role as Lydia Bennet in *Pride & Prejudice*, mostly because that's how I met my husband, who played Wickham! We like to joke that we eloped and then he asked me out. Another favorite was playing Snoopy in *You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown*. And my favorite in the last 5 years would be playing A Murderess in *A Midnight Dreary*. I've had a lot of fun playing very diverse roles. How many people get the chance to play a dancing, singing dog?

You regularly contribute your talents at the Library and have offered summer workshops for teens. Why do you like working with young people? I love seeing the next generation of artists and writers come to life. These kids have so much imagination; nothing holds them back. I love watching that unbridled creative find a venue. Also, everyone is very supportive of each other. In a world where you constantly hear about bullying, I love that we have this little haven for 7 weeks in the summer where these kids know they can come and be completely themselves; not only that, but they are daily encouraged to be as creative as they want! When I was a teen I was very creative and imaginative which a lot of kids decided meant I was "weird." I like being able to tell these kids, "You're not weird; you're awesome! And you are going to create wonderful things." I love the opportunity to help teens understand that about themselves.

Every year, your company Ghostlight Productions produces Shakespeare in the Park in South Abington Park, Clarks Summit. Can you tell us a bit about this year's performances? Will there be open auditions? Why yes, there are open auditions at the Library on Sunday, March 9th at 2 p.m. and Monday, March 10th at 6 p.m. Auditions are open to anyone ages 16 and up. This year we're doing Macbeth, the story of a man whose ambition to be king overwhelms his moral convictions. This is only the second of Shakespeare's tragedies we've ever tackled and we're prepared to have a lot of fun with the fight scenes in particular. My husband Jonathan is directing it and he has a lot of really exciting ideas. We're always looking for new people, and this year in particular we need a lot of men! So if you've never auditioned but always thought it might be fun, we hope to see you at auditions in March.

Your play, Drowning Ophelia, was just produced in San Francisco last year. What was that experience like for you? Are you currently writing your next play? Is it cheating to say the experience was indescribable? Really, it could not have been better. Ellery Schaar, who directed the play, did a beautiful job guiding her actors into bringing my script to life. My favorite thing about theatre being a collaboration is that the actors and director can bring so much more to a script than a playwright even realized was possible and that definitely happened. It was very surreal and wonderful. In terms of what I'm working on right now, I am trying to finish a young adult novel that I've been working on for a while. I'm also writing a ten-minute play for Gaslight Theatre Company's annual Playroom series (Gaslight is a theatre group in Wilkes-Barre not to be confused with Ghostlight...though they often are!). As far as another full-length play, I'm still bashing around a few ideas. I just have to pick one and find time to work on it!
